
 The structure of CTA has evolved through out its existence since March 10, 1978. We need to highlight the founding members for their vision.





Although the fur industry is not at its best, we continue to harvest quality fur. Hunters & trappers of Eeyou Istchee are recognized for their harvesting techniques & the pelts are sought.





- Harvest database, Since early 1990 CTA has documented the number of small game species harvested in Eeyou Istchee.
- This important data can be a contributor to wildlife management.



 CTA continues to offer the Firearms Safety course & Introduction to hunting with firearms course in Eeyou Istchee.

 In 2017 new instructors were trained and are certified. We have instructors in each community that can deliver these courses.



- Cabin program
 - We plan to construct 27 cabins this year, 3 cabins per community
- Cabin insurance program
 - Currently there are 252 cabins that are insured in all Eeyou Istchee



Toxic Metal in Wild meat Project

This study is collecting tissue samples from hunted animals to test them for contamination from environmental pollutants such as lead and pesticides

Program goal



The steward Is responsible for managing the use of the indoowho Istchee, in accordance with Cree traditions and with a view to sustainability of wildlife and resources.

- Acquire knowledge on Cree Traditional practices
- Acquire effective working methods
- Awareness of the impacts and consequences of quality work;
- Develop professional skills
- Develop a concern for sustainable development.
- Develop the necessary rigor to solve problems

Competencies




- Analyzing the work function related to the Cree Land Stewardship.
- Appreciating elements of Cree culture.
- Providing for your own needs for lodging and food on the land safely.
- Crafting tools that are adequate for life on the land.
- Working safely in isolation in rugged conditions on the land.
- Conducting inventory of the biotic and the abiotic components on trapline.
- Detecting the presence of wildlife species.

- Transmitting values, principles and best practices to members of the community.
- Executing wildlife resource harvesting activities safely.
- Contributing in the negotiations concerning the harvesting of natural resources on a Cree land.
- Ensuring surveillance on a trapline.
- Managing wildlife habitat.
- Managing the harvesting of wildlife resources on a Cree land.

Courses

The vast majority of the courses will be given in the Cree language on Cree traplines and by CREE

College St. Felicien

 CEGEP St- Félicien co-instructors will facilitate student evaluations and ensure that Ministry of Education requirements are satisfied.

Minister of Education (Quebec)

The Eeyou/Eenou Ituun Training Program is a fully accredited Attestation of Collegial Studies (ATS) certified by the Québec Ministry of Education. Meaning that the program will receive guaranteed partial funding from the Ministry as long as there are students registered in the program.
